## FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE GRANTS AND AWARDS COMMITTEE REMARKS BY

## HER EXCELLENCY THE HONOURABLE BARBARA BAKER AC GOVERNOR OF TASMANIA GOVERNMENT HOUSE, THURSDAY 24 NOVEMBER 2022

Good morning. May I warmly welcome you to Government House for this Florence Nightingale Grants and Awards presentations for 2022.

As your Patron, I am once again very pleased to be hosting the announcement of this year's Florence Nightingale Grants and Awards recipients.

The Committee was established in the 1950s. The grants provide Tasmanian registered nurses with the financial opportunity through study grants, to undertake post-graduate studies<sup>1</sup>.

The main source of funding for these grants has been through the St John's Hospital Association and generous donations from Tasmanian nurses and the general public.

Your Committee promotes these important grants with applications opening annually on 12 May, International Nurses Day. Significantly, this is also the anniversary date of the birth of Florence Nightingale, in 1820.

The global COVID-19 pandemic certainly raised the profile of nurses and midwives, as you all demonstrated the vital role you play in supporting the health and wellbeing in our communities.

The Florence Nightingale Grants and Awards recognise the achievement and contribution of nurses and midwives, and their commitment to professional excellence.

Scholarships are available every year to enable recipients to undertake postgraduate study. The following two grants<sup>2</sup> are being awarded for 2022:

First, The Leonie Sidebottom Study Grant.

Leonie Sidebottom was the first Registrar of Nurses in Tasmania. Leonie held her position for 12 years, retiring in 1963. She applied the Nurses Registration Act in 1952 which set up the nurses' registration system in Tasmania. The 2022 grant award is valued at \$3 000.

Second, The Robyn Whitworth Study Grant.

Robyn Whitworth was a community health nurse and supervisor on the North-West Coast. She was one of the first palliative care nurses appointed in the community. After her untimely death, her nursing colleagues started a fund to provide a grant for Tasmanian nurses in her name. The 2022 grant award is valued at \$2 000.
