## LIFELINE AUSTRALIA 60<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY REMARKS BY HER EXCELLENCY THE HONOURABLE BARBARA BAKER AC GOVERNOR OF TASMANIA GOVERNMENT HOUSE, TUESDAY 7 MARCH 2023

Good evening everyone. I warmly welcome you all to this reception for Tasmanian Staff and Volunteers of Lifeline Australia to mark the significant 60th anniversary of your formation.

I pay my respects to the traditional and original owners of this land: the palawa people. I acknowledge the contemporary Tasmanian Aboriginal community and recognise their enduring culture and continued connection to land, sea, and waters. I acknowledge the impacts of colonisation upon our First People and commit to a future that listens to and respects Aboriginal stories, culture and history.

The celebration of 60 years of operation is a significant milestone for any organisation. For Lifeline, it would be a difficult task to quantify the benefits and services you have offered to the Australian community over that period.

Lifeline had its genesis in the unfortunate loss of a life to suicide. Founder, the Reverend Dr Sir Alan Walker, responded to the death of a man in distress who had reached out to him. His response was to address the issues of isolation and lack of support by launching a 24-hour telephone support service.

Lifeline Australia has grown since then and you now have some 10,000 volunteers and 1,000 staff. They receive a call on the crisis line every 30 seconds!

I was very pleased to learn that Lifeline launched the 12YARN line in 2022. This is the first national support line for Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander people in crisis. It offers a confidential one-on-one opportunity over the phone to "yarn" and get support with a Lifeline trained Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Crisis Supporter. It is aimed for mob who are feeling overwhelmed or having difficulty coping. We know that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are significantly over-represented in suicide numbers.<sup>1</sup>

In Lifeline Tasmania, we have about 300 volunteers and 80 staff state-wide. Records show that, in 2022, Lifeline received just under 8,000 calls from people in Tasmania. I note that you have recently set up the 'Tasmanian Lifeline' service. That service complements the national crisis line service and provides for people who are experiencing psychological distress.

Our Mental Health Council of Tasmania stresses, however, that psychological distress is not a mental illness. In these difficult times, many Tasmanians are experiencing stress, anxiety, worry, fear and a sense of helplessness.

The new Lifeline Tasmania service provides information on the resources available to support those impacted by change, in the way Tasmanians go about their daily lives, including social isolation, loss of employment, homelessness, and financial challenges. These services are also aimed at health professionals, working for extended periods in a high-risk environment. <sup>2</sup>

Lifeline Tasmania maintains its vision of a Tasmania free of suicide, and these developments show that Lifeline continues to adapt to changing needs in our community as well as preferred methods of engagement by clients.
