AFTERNOON TEA TO MARK THE 35TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BELLERIVE HISTORICAL SOCIETY REMARKS BY HER EXCELLENCY THE HONOURABLE BARBARA BAKER AC

GOVERNOR OF TASMANIA GOVERNMENT HOUSE, TUESDAY 7 OCTOBER 2025

Good afternoon, everyone. I warmly welcome you all to Government House to mark the 35th anniversary of the Bellerive Historical Society.

May I begin by acknowledging the Muwinina people upon whose land we gather. I acknowledge today's Tasmanian Aboriginal Community as ongoing custodians of Country. I recognise their enduring culture and deep connection to land, sea, sky, and waters.

Today, we are here to celebrate not only 35 years of your Society, but also two centuries of Bellerive itself.

First settled by Europeans in the 1820s, the community across the River Derwent from Hobart Town was initially known as Kangaroo Point.¹ By the 1830s, however, it became the more poetic Bellerive – 'beautiful riverbank', in French.

As the years passed, an increasing number of people settled in Bellerive as their home. Schools, churches, inns and fine houses were steadily built. Many are still standing today.³

Still more people made the ferry journey from the city to enjoy a day at Bellerive Beach or a trip on the train from Kangaroo Bay to Sorell.⁴ In the late 1800s, Bellerive also played a role in Hobart's defence, establishing the Kangaroo Bluff Battery.⁵

I also commend your focus on cataloguing a wealth of historic documents and images, which will ensure Bellerive's history continues to be preserved.⁸ May I also applaud your commitment to sharing research and information through your regular newsletters and monthly meetings.

Over these past 35 years, you have built a community of people committed to caring for local heritage. May I thank you for all that you do to remember and celebrate Bellerive's stories.
