HER EXCELLENCY THE HONOURABLE BARBARA BAKER AC GOVERNOR OF TASMANIA GOVERNMENT HOUSE, FRIDAY 21 NOVEMBER 2025

Good afternoon, everyone.

I warmly welcome you all to Government House to recognise and celebrate your participation in the 2025 AFS Youth Assembly and International Affairs Academy. May I thank you for your report you will share with us today, with particular thanks to its lead author, Harry Watson of Hobart College.

You engaged with the SDG Zone, a space dedicated to engaging young people in the UN's sustainable development goals, you interacted in the Action & Impact Hub, and you explored opportunities for your future studies and careers.

One of the highlights of this year's program was the International Youth Day Celebration, organised by AFS Intercultural Programs, UNITAR, and the Permanent Mission of Malta to the United Nations.

Some delegates took part in specialised Academies before the Youth Assembly commenced; programs focusing on climate entrepreneurship, changemaking, global education, and international affairs. Your selection for these programs is evidence of your capability, your motivation, and the promise others see in you.

One of the most significant outcomes of this year's Assembly was the cocreation of the *Declaration of Impact*—a collective commitment to driving positive change in your communities and beyond. It stresses partnerships, shared responsibility and the urgency of addressing global challenges.

As Tasmanians, you bring this Declaration home not merely as a document, but as a call to action.

All of us here today are immensely proud of your achievements.

Thank you for the way you have represented our State. Thank you to your teachers, families and supporters who have helped bring you to this point. And thank you again for the report you will share with us today.
